

## **BOOK REVIEW**

## **MYTHOS** A Mythology by Stephen Fry

Stephen Fry, well known as a writer and broadcaster delivered this book as a one man show in Edinburgh which I understand lasted around seven or eight hours. What a marathon for both raconteur and his audience!

## **Remembrance Sunday**


On Sunday 10th November we saw our Village Hall revert to a Church for our Remembrance Day Service. The service was a solemn but beautiful occasion and our thanks go to Beryl Moppet MBE for leading the service and Bruce Hart for the musical accompaniment. The font is the Village Memorial to all the fallen heroes from Catherine-de-Barnes who died in both WW1 and WW2.

The names of those who died during WW1 are engraved on a brass plaque which surrounds the top of the font and the names of the fallen from WW2 are engraved on brass plaques on the cover of the font. One of the names of the fallen from WW1 was originally, accidentally omitted and his name is engraved on the lid of a brass jug that sits on the base of the font.



## BOOK REVIEW THE GANGS OF BIRMINGHAM

The True Story of the Peaky Blinders Philip Gooderson

I must confess, I was slightly taken in by the subtitle of this book, having seen some of the very watchable television series. The book was in fact first published in 2010, without the subtitle and is one of a series of stories of City Gangs.

The main draw to me – The Peaky Blinders – doesn't appear until chapter 16 and then as just a reference to them as another Gang who dressed differently.

I don't regard this as a well written book; it doesn't flow well and there is too much repetition. The interest really for me is in the location. The street names are in most cases familiar, making it difficult to relate the modern City of Birmingham with its state at the end of the nineteenth century.

Another criticism is the lack of more social and political context apart from the limited police force. The introducing of standard education and the building of schools was fundamental to the demise of the gangs, plus new housing development, but the political background to that is not explained.

An interesting subject if you are local – I have lived here over 50 years, most of them working in Birmingham – but not told too well.

# IT'S TIME TO WATCH "IT'S A WONDERFUL LIFE!"

It was:

300 years ago, on 31<sup>st</sup> Dec 1719 that John Flamsteed, British astronomer died. He was the first Astronomer Royal, and founder of the Greenwich Observatory.

150 years ago, on 31<sup>st</sup> Dec 1869 that Henri Matisse, the French artist, was born. He became leader of the Fauvist movement.

125 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> Dec 1894 that Robert Louis Stevenson died. This Scottish novelist, short story writer, poet, essayist and travel writer was best known for his novels *Treasure Island, Kidnapped* and the *Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde*.

Also 125 years ago, on 29<sup>th</sup> Dec 1894 that Christina Rossetti, British poet and hymnwriter, died.

100 years ago, on 1st Dec 1919 that Lady Nancy Astor became the first female Member of Parliament (MP) to take her seat in the House of Commons.

90 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> Dec 1929 that John Osborne, British playwright, screenwriter and producer, was born. He was the first of the Angry Young Men, and best known for his play *Look Back in Anger* (died 1994).

80 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 1939 that Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer made his first ever appearance, in a children's colouring book given away by Montgomery Ward stores in the USA.

75 years ago, on 16<sup>th</sup> Dec 1944 to 16<sup>th</sup> Jan 1945 that World War II's Battle of the Bulge took place in Belgium. It was the last major German counter-offensive of the war, and an Allied victory.

70 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 1949 that Pablo Escobar, Colombian drug lord, was born. Head of the Medellin cartel, and considered the world's most powerful drug trafficker of the 1980s and early 1990s. (Shot dead by police in 1993, though some say it was suicide.)

60 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 1959 that 12 countries including the UK and USA, signed the Antarctic Treaty, setting aside Antarctica as a scientific preserve free from military activity.

50 years ago, on 18<sup>th</sup> Dec 1969 that the British Government abolished the death penalty for murder.

40 years ago, on 20<sup>th</sup> Dec 1979 that the British Government announced that council tenants would be given the right to buy their homes under a new Housing Act (effective from October 1980)

30 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> Dec 1989 that US President George H W Bush and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev announced the end of the Cold War at a meeting in Malta.

Also 30 years ago, on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1989 that the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin was reopened, effectively reuniting East and West Germany.

20 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 1999 that an international team of scientists announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome. (All human chromosomes were mapped by April 2003.)

Also 20 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> Dec 1999 that the UK devolved political power in Northern Ireland to the Northern Ireland Assembly and Executive Committee.

Also 20 years ago, on 31 Dec 1999 that the London Eye, at that time the world's tallest Ferris wheel – was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames. Because of mechanical problems, it didn't open to passengers until 9<sup>th</sup> March 2000.

15 years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> Dec 2004 that the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also known as the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing over 230,000 people in 14 countries.

10 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Dec 2009 that the Treaty of Lisbon came into effect. It amended the Maastricht Treaty and the Treaty of Rome, which form the constitutional basis of the European Union.

#### **Fish Pie Jackets**

4 large baking potatoes
Olive oil for rubbing
75g butter
300ml milk
1 bay leaf
6 black peppercorns
260g pack sustainable fish pie mix (we used Waitrose)
180g sustainable peeled prawns
25g plain flour
75ml dry white wine
Grated zest and juice 1 lemon
A few fresh chives, snipped
Handful fresh parsley, chopped
1 tsp wholegrain mustard

50g hard cheese (such as cheddar), grated

## Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6. Prick the potatoes all over with a fork, then rub with oil and salt. Bake on a baking tray for 1 hour or until cooked through. When cool enough to handle, cut roughly 2cm off the top of each potato (reserve to serve as skins). Scoop out the potato flesh into a bowl, leaving a 1cm potato shell. Mash the flesh with 50g butter and season. Set aside.
- 2. Warm the milk in a medium pan with the bay and peppercorns, then add the fish and prawns and poach for 3 minutes or until just cooked. Transfer the fish and prawns to a plate using a slotted spoon and keep warm. Discard the bay/peppercorns and reserve the poaching milk.
- 3. Melt the remaining butter in a separate medium pan and whisk in the flour. Cook for 3-4 minutes, then slowly whisk in the wine and reserved poaching milk. Simmer, stirring, for 10 minutes until thickened. Add the lemon zest and juice (to taste), herbs and mustard, then stir in the fish and prawns.
- 4. Spoon the fish and sauce into the potato shells and top with the mash and cheese. Put on a baking tray with the crispy potato skins on the side and bake for 20 minutes until piping hot and the cheese is golden.
  - 5. Fill with the sauce up to 24 hours ahead, cool and chill, covered. Bake in a hot oven for 25-30 minutes until golden brown.
