## **NEWS FROM YOUR RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION**

### Hampton in Arden Neighbourhood Plan

Many of you will know that the part of the village on the east side of the canal bridge was the only part originally in Hampton Parish and covered by the original Parish Neighbourhood Plan (NP). In April 2019 the boundary of the Parish was extended to include the whole of Catherine de Barnes and therefore it was necessary for the NP to be reviewed if it was to incorporate the enlarged parish. This review process has started with all residents and businesses receiving a survey the results of which will lead to the formulating of a new updated NP. This is the opportunity for residents to influence how the Parish should develop over the next 10/15 years and urge you all to make your views known by completing the surveys and returning them to the Parish Council by the end of September. The Parish Council NP Working Group are keen to involve members of the community in formulating the Plan .If you are interested in getting involved please contact the Clerk of the Parish Council.

### **Planning**

### M42 Link Road

Following the decision to build the new link road some works /surveys have commenced with more works due to start in October with works at the WGAA. Together with representatives of the Parish Council a member of the RA committee recently attended a meeting at Skanska ( the main contractor along with Mott Macdonald ) to discuss a number of issues, including road closures, and haulage routes. . We have been assured that throughout the project both Solihull Road and Catherine de Barnes Lane will largely remain open, although there could well be the occasional closure in which case we should get at least 1 weeks- notice. We have also had assurances that there will be no heavy goods vehicles associated with the scheme coming through CdeB. A full timetable for the scheme will be available for next months issue .

## 2015/51409 Motorway Service Area at the new Junction 5a

The saga continues. It is now expected that we might get a decision towards the end of the year. The Association in conjunction with the Parish Council are committed to opposing the scheme and are in regular contact with our ward councillors regarding the application. The Association will be submitting a further response later in September which will be available on our website www.catney.co.uk should residents wish to see our grounds for seeking refusal of the scheme.

## <u>2019/3108 Change of use at Woodhouse Farm - namely a HGV transport yard and operating bases for vehicles and trailers .</u>

This application was refused by Solihull MBC on the grounds of unacceptable development within the Green Belt but we understand the applicant has now appealed the decision we should have more information concerning the type of enquiry that will be ensue next month.

## Catney Common news.

The common has been mown again and will need at least one more cut before the grass stops growing. Next year we are hoping to set up a proper contract for the grass so that our wonderful volunteers can concentrate on improvement and keeping the woodland areas cared for. I would like to thank them all for their work on the common, suspended by Covid restrictions but now in full swing. Their support is so important.

**Meadow flowers.** We have asked for advice from Solihull Council, who have done a lot with wild fowers on the verges and in the parks this year. They are going to send proposals so that we can try and create at least one area to encourage flowers and pollinators. This is not straightforward as we know to our cost. The common has rich soil and grass soon swamps the more fragile flowers. We cannot leave the whole area unmown as it becomes unusable when the grass gets too long. A balancing act!

The broken and missing logs around the edge are due to be replaced to deter cars.

Finally a special plea on behalf of the Common for everyone to complete the parish Survey which is being sent to each household. Without a 'Parish Plan', highlighting what is important to local people and what makes the area important to us, it is difficult to influence future development. Thank you.



## **BOOK REVIEW**

A COLUMN OF FIRE
A historical novel by Ken Follett

Ken Follett is a very well known author of historical novels and Column of Fire is a random selection, which offers an introduction to his style of writing and is his third in a Kingsbridge trilogy.

Although the basis of the novel is Kingsbridge in the south of England and links the fortunes of three local families, the story ranges over Europe and the Caribbean.

Real events, including the Babbington Plot and the fate of Mary Queen of Scots, the St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre in Paris and the Spanish Armada, together with the Gunpowder Plot are woven into the story following Ned Willard who becomes a deputy to Francis Walsingham the Spymaster to Queen Elizabeth 1st.

The three families referred to, the Fitzgeralds, the Willards and the Cobleys, whose interlinked lives form the basis of the novel are on opposite sides of the Catholic / Protestant, Mary / Elizabeth divide, reflect the very difficult times of 16th. and 17th. Century Europe.

I like Follett's story telling, but then as you may have noticed I am a fan of the historical novel and would certainly recommend this novel for holiday or lockdown reading.

#### **METHOD**

Place the apples in a saucepan with the sugar. Cover and set over a low heat until the juice begins to come out of the apples. Slightly increase the heat and cook until the apples are soft, then set aside to cool

Preheat the oven to 165°C/ 325° F/ gas mark 3

For the shortbread base, cream together the butter and sugar, add the egg and milk, then mix in the flours, baking powder and wheatgerm. Spread over the bottom of a greased cake tin (approximately 20cm x 20cm x 5cm) and bake in the oven for 10 minutes. Leave to cool in the tin

Make the crumble by mixing all the dry ingredients together, ie. everything except the butter. Put the butter in a small saucepan, melt over a moderate heat, then pour it over the dry ingredients and mix together

Spread the apple over the shortbread base, then sprinkle the crumble mix over the top. Bake for 10-15 minutes until lightly golden

## **APPLE CRUMBLE SLICE**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

#### **APPLES**

6 Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and sliced 100g of caster sugar

#### **SHORTBREAD BASE**

75g of unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing

1 free-range egg, beaten

40g of caster sugar

2 tbsp of semi-skimmed milk

75g of plain flour

50g of wholemeal flour

25g of wheatgerm

1/2 tsp baking powder

#### **CRUMBLE**

50g of oats, rolled

40g of wholemeal flour

50g of walnuts, chopped

15g of wheatgerm

1 pinch of salt

50g of caster sugar

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp ground ginger

1/2 nutmeg, freshly grated

60g of unsalted butter

#### TO PLATE

1 tub of vanilla ice cream

Serve the apple crumble slice warm with a quenelle of vanilla ice cream
