Planning News

Motorway Service Area (MSA) at the new jct5a currently being built on Solihull Road

As most of you will know the Planning Inspector upheld the appeal by Extra which reverses SMBC's decision to refuse the planning application. As the development relies on All Lane Running it is unlikely that any work will commence until 2025 as the Government has put a hold on any new schemes until 5 years' worth of safety data is available as to how safe ALR schemes are.

The data will not be available until sometime in 2024 and then needs to be analysed and decisions made as to whether ALR schemes are safe. The Association is working with the Parish Council, Ward Councillors and our local MP to see what avenues are left open which could delay or hopefully cancel the project but realistically I think the odds are not in our favour.

Other News

Traffic Calming Scheme / Proposals

Thanks to those who attended the meeting in the Village Hall on the 15th March to view and comment on the proposals. It was a very worthwhile and productive event with a number of suggestions being put forward by local residents which will be discussed at the next meeting with SMBC Highways.

As was explained at the meeting the current proposals cost in the region of £80/90,000. The scheme in principle has been put forward to National Highways via Skanska (the contractors for the new link road) for 100% funding via their Legacy Funding Schemes and although we have no written undertaking at the moment, we have been told that it is being viewed in a positive light – fingers crossed.

We will let you know more as and when more information is forthcoming.

Hampton in Arden Parish Neighbourhood Plan Review

A final draft of the new plan has been given to SMBC for unofficial comment. Based on the response from them it is quite possible that the first consultation document could be circulated for public consultation end of May /June time.

Village Hall News

The Trustees are still working on the scheme to install a children's play area at the rear of the Village Hall . The funding of £43k is in place but there are a few issues relating to the Trusts covering the Hall and Grounds which we need to be resolved. The Parish Council, who through Community Infrastructure Levy have committed £36k to the project , wish to have a legal involvement with the site and are prepared to take a lease on the area. Once the legalise has been resolved, the order can be placed and hopefully we should have a playground ready for next spring at the very latest.






BOOK REVIEW

WHERE THE CRAWDADS SING

A novel by Delia Owens

This is a debut novel by Delia Owens, an American wildlife scientist, set in the marshland of North Carolina. It raises a number of issues such as racial and social divisions, family and the natural world.

Kya Clark's father, without any real job has settled his family, like many others, in the Marshland where over centuries people were able to claim squatters rights within the inhospitable land.

Kya's family of hardly-ever-there-father, mother, brother and two sisters live a barely habitable shack, eking out a barely sustainable living and one by one they leave. Firstly the two girls then her brother of whom Kya was very fond and finally her mother, tiring eventually of her violent husband just walks away leaving her sixteen year old daughter to fend for herself, after her father who returns again for a short while also finally departs.

Kyle, who has no wish to leave the Marsh has to learn to grow up in what is to her an alien world. She meets Tate and Kyle, two very different boys from the nearby small coastal town and her relationships with them and the world around her are developed beautifully as she learns to read and understand her position in an alien world.

The death of Kyle and the subsequent trial of Kya being accused of his murder, introduces further social and racial issues which are handled equally well by the author.

I really enjoyed reading this book, particularly its direct link with the natural world.

Baked Ricotta with Spice-Poached Rhubarb

Ingredients

- 12 ounces rhubarb, trimmed and cut into 1-inch lengths
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar,
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest plus 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt,
- 1 whole star anise
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 16 ounces best-quality wholemilk ricotta cheese (such as Galbani)
- 1 large egg
- 2 tablespoons honey
- ¼ teaspoon of pure vanilla essence
- Unsalted butter for greasing dish

Method

- Preheat oven to 325°F. Combine rhubarb and 1/2 cup sugar in a mixing bowl.
- Add lemon juice and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Toss to coat the rhubarb evenly.
- Arrange in a single layer in a 2-quart baking dish.
- Tuck star anise and cinnamon stick into the dish.
- Cover with aluminum foil, and roast in preheated oven until rhubarb is tender when pierced with the tip of a knife, 20 to 25 minutes.
- Set aside, covered, to cool.
- The roasted rhubarb can be refrigerated up to 2 days.
- Spoon the ricotta into a food processor fitted with the chopping blade.
- Add egg, honey, vanilla, lemon zest, remaining 1/4 cup sugar, and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Process until very smooth, about 1 minute.
- Lightly grease a 1-quart baking dish or a 9- to 10-inch pie plate.
- Scrape the ricotta mixture into the baking dish, and bake at 325°F until fragrant and toasty brown around the edges, about 1 hour. (The top may puff up as it bakes, but it will settle once out of the oven.)
- Let stand at room temperature at least 10 minutes. Serve warm, at room temperature, or chilled, topped with rhubarb mixture.

Gardening in April

Shrubs

Some people say it's best to cut <u>lavender</u> back in autumn but April is a better option, especially if you live in a frost-prone area. If you prune in autumn, all the new cuts you make will be exposed and open to infection through winter, but prune now and the plant can start growing quickly. Just turn a blind eye to the dead stems during the winter months. Lavenders are notorious for getting straggly and leggy and the best way to avoid that is to give them a really hard prune.

Tip: Look for the lowest little bud on each stem that's about to sprout and cut just above it.

Perennials

Direct sow annuals such as nigella, cosmos and Californian poppies in any gaps you have in the beds. These are the 'throw and sow' seeds and couldn't be easier. Just ensure that as far as possible the ground is clear of weeds, well-fed and raked, and then sprinkle the seeds on the surface. They should germinate in a matter of days.

Fruit and vegetables

This is the month to start off most sowings – broad beans, beetroot, Brussels sprouts, broccoli, cabbages, carrots, leeks, parsnip, peas and spinach. Also plant out seed potatoes and raspberry and blackberry canes.

There's still time to put strawberries and asparagus into permanent beds. Now is also the ideal month to plant globe and Jerusalem artichokes.

Under cover, keep sowing any tender vegetables you want to grow, such as aubergines, sweetcorn and melons. Don't forget to put in a few sunflower seeds – they'll brighten up the patch and can fit in the <u>smallest space</u>.
