Solihull Local Plan Review

You will recall that we outlined the two options open to the Council following the Planning Inspector's decision not to proceed with the examination of the Draft Local Plan as it stood. Following a Council Cabinet meeting it has been decided to withdraw the plan. An extract of an article by the Leader of the Council follows:-"So, with the Plan withdrawn we must now start work immediately on a new plan. We will have to take into account the government's changes in calculating housing needs, which could increase the borough's housing requirement by an eye watering 52%! This will undoubtedly involve, again, very difficult decisions around sites for new homes and a close examination of the new planning rules. Fortunately, most of the work done on the previous plan will be relevant. In any new plan, I want to remain committed to maximising our Brownfield land and ensuring any site for new homes or jobs is supported by the necessary infrastructure. However, with the change of government, our options might be restricted and not be as expansive as we would wish. We may have little room for manoeuvre. With the fact that SMBC cannot demonstrate a 5 year land supply this could open the flood gates to numerous planning applications both on sites allocated in the review plan and new sites which will be difficult to argue against."

Motorway Service Area (MSA) to be sited adjacent to new junction 5a off Solihull Road

Following the meeting mentioned in last month's edition we can announce the development is alive and well. There is a significant amount of design work still to do but the project is expected to start towards the end of '25 early '26 and the build phase is expected to last '2 to 3 years. During the initial discussion it has been agreed no construction vehicles should need to access the site through either CdeB or Hampton.

Arrangements have been made for quarterly meetings to be held with the PC and the developer at which the RA will be represented. The first meeting will be held in at the end of January.

PL 2024/01173/PPOL Outline planning application for up to 95 homes on Oak Farm, CdeB

This outline planning application was considered by the Planning Committee on the 11th September and approved. As it was an outline application only the access and the maximum number of homes were agreed, all other matters, e.g. layout of the site, design of the homes etc., will be the subject of a Reserved Matters application presumably in the not too distant future. The Committee together with the PC will be hoping to arrange meetings with the developer as soon as possible to discuss various aspects of the project and it's impact on the Village.

Airport Matters - New Night Flying Policy

AS most of you will be aware, Birmingham Airport lodged a planning application with SMBC ref Pl2024/01917/M106 to change the 106 agreement (by requesting a change to the way the maximum number of night flights is calculated) and to agree a new Night Flying Policy. We emailed members to make them aware of the situation also requesting them to write objecting to the new figures which equated to an increase of up to 47% over current numbers. The Association has submitted a response which can be viewed on our website www.catney.co.uk. We understand that the application is likely to be heard by the Planning Committee on the 4th December and we are in discussion with the PC and other communities concerning the possibility of addressing the Committee opposing the application. A meeting with our Ward Councillors has been held and one of them will be addressing the Committee on the night expressing local concerns.

Village Hall Update

At long last we are pleased to announce that The Trustees have been successful in receiving a grant from National Highways Social Fund of £5986.61p towards the village hall kitchen refurbishment. Work will start at the end of October hopefully being completed within the week. The remaining costs will be shared by the RA and the Trustees on a 50/50 basis.

The Trustees have also been getting quotes to refurbish the hall floor, but due to the initial response it looks like that project will need to go on the back burner for a little while.

Village Traffic Calming Measures

Following a meeting with Highways we should be receiving the final design proposals for the scheme shortly. Once received the plan is to hold a village meeting in order that everyone who is interested can see the final proposals which incorporate some of the comments raised at the meeting earlier in the year. We understand that the work is to be scheduled for summer 26.

As an aside, Contractors and members of SMBC were spotted in Oakfields Way recently and we understand that there are plans to re-tarmac it but no timescale was mentioned . We will attempt to get more information at the next meeting with Highways .


WELCOME PACK FOR NEW RESIDENTS

History of Catney Village Hall

In 1879 a dual purpose chapel and day school was opened in Hampton Lane at the expense of Joseph Gillott, a wealthy pen manufacturer. At that time it was not under the auspices of The Church of England. On his death in 1903 his estate was sold and a group of trustees were able to buy the building in 1937 The school is fondly remembered by those who attended, but it closed in 1974. The Charity Commission passed the administration and management of the property to the Church of England. The church became one of the sister churches to St. Alphege. Due to falling attendances, the number of services was reduced to one a month in May 2007 and ceased altogether after the final service on Sunday, June 20th 2010. The building is now managed by local residents as "Trustees" and the building continues to serve the community as the village hall with occasional services such as Remembrance being held. The Sanctuary at the east end of the building is furnished for worship but this is curtained off when the building is used for community events.


It is registered as a building of significant historical interest.

Over the centre of the building is a timber framed turret containing three bells that are hung dead, with the tenor on top of the other two. The bells, which have canons, are sounded via ropes that are connected to the clappers.


December 17th

BOOK REVIEW by JOHN ALDERSON THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY

A Novel by Amor Towles



Some of you may recall my very positive review of "A Gentleman in Moscow" by Amor Towles and I was delighted to find another book by the same author - "The Lincoln Highway".

In many ways, this is an even more delightful book with its range of young characters trying to fulfil a dream. The chapters are each defined by relating by name to one of the individuals and therefor continuously explains their various backgrounds and reveals more of their characters in detail as the story moves along. This is a very helpful device which enables the reader to understand more readily some of the actions taken by the young people.

The scene is Nebraska in the American Mid-West in the 1950's when Emmett Watson has been driven home from a stint in a young offenders institution in Salina. His father, a failed farmer, has died and his younger brother Billy has been staying with a neighbour whose daughter Sally is a similar age to Emmett. The brothers decide there is nothing for them now in Morgen and decide after clear prompting from Billy that they will leave and drive to California on the Lincoln Highway in the only possession that they have left - a powder blue, four door hardtop, 1948 Studebaker Land Cruiser.

The story, in which the boys find themselves teamed up with a couple of other Salina friends, is how they try to get to California: being full of twists and turns with them often going in the wrong direction. The joy of this book is in the drawing of its characters. It's beautifully written with lots of emotion and observation of America in the 50's.

A second small book which might be of interest is "RIVETS, TRIVETS AND GALVANISED BUCKETS" by Tom Fort, which is a lovely story of a man who moves out of his comfort zone to take over a village hardware shop; a 1920's building which has seen better days and is filled with goods he knows nothing about. A nostalgic and very English true story.

Catney Clean Up day

Twenty-one volunteers and a beautiful dog turned out on Saturday morning and collected over 20 bags of litter from the streets and lanes of Catherine de Barnes. The litter pickers were rewarded with refreshments afterwards in the Village Hall.
